

Comrades and Sisters/Brothers,

Already two months have gone by since being installed as your Commander and all I can say is "WOW", what an honor, challenge and mostly rewarding opportunity this has been and will continue to be. We need to start the year right by working hard and early on membership. Sean Johnson and DD Couch will do all they can, however they will need your recruiting effort to succeed. I have been talking about membership forever it seems and will continue to do so until our department has achieved a minimum of 100%. As I am out and about recruiting I always get asked the same question when talking to a veteran who is not a member, and that question is "what is in it for me, or what has the VFW done for me? Well I hope not to bore you with numbers but I find that knowing the facts of our organization will help you answer these questions. More importantly once you have answered the question most every veteran you are talking with will admit that they had no idea we did that. Most of them will be willing to join a team that has their SIX and proves it. We accomplish so many things that people are unaware of that it is time we start bragging a little bit about ourselves. So here I go with the "DID YOU KNOW".

- In 2016 our Washington DC legislative team testified 22 times before Congress on many Veterans issues. The VFW has been instrumental in virtually every legislative victory for veterans in 20th and 21st century.
- Our organization combined with our Auxiliary consists of 1.7 million members. That's a lot of voters. We also have 6,498 VFW posts worldwide.
- We have 1,945 VA accredited VFW representatives across America and abroad helping veterans file VA benefits. VFW assisted veterans with 116,791 claims in 2016. This totaled \$1.2 billion dollars in 2016.
- VFW posts around the world provided 806 million hours of volunteer hours. We also donate \$49.8 million dollars to local community service projects.
- We have honored or fallen comrades by distributing 9.5 million Buddy

- Poppies last year, which raised 12.3 million dollars for needy veterans.
- Since 2004 the VFW has provided 4,609 Unmet Needs Grants to struggling military families. These grants have totaled \$3,581,947. Of these grants 2,450 have been to assist with housing needs for veteran's families.
- In 2016-17 46,000+ high school students participated in the Voice of Democracy program. 122,000+ participated in the Patriot Pen program. These two programs payed \$3.3 million dollars in scholarships, monetary awards, and other prizes.

Nobody does more for Veterans, and we prove It. Let's get out there, brag a little about what we do, and "Dig In" for new members.

VFW Baseball has come to the end of our season with some great tournament games being played. I must give a big shout out to Danny Frisby-Griffin and Rob Lynde. They did a great job this year running this program and the feedback I received from coaches, players, parents, and umpires was nothing less than fantastic. Excellent job gentlemen and I thank you for your efforts and dedication.

I had the honor of watching Past Cmdr. Sharp receive his All-American cap in New Orleans. I must admit that I really have the desire to do the same thing next year. These awards are not achieved by the Commander alone, it takes the effort of everyone within the Department of South Dakota. I hope and trust that you will help me achieve this honor again this year. Congratulations Dennis.

I also traveled to Cincinnati, Oh. to attend the Commander -in Chiefs Homecoming, was a great time and like always was great to see Chief Harman and my fellow commander from the other departments. Ohio had a very nice, well planned event for their Chief.

As I have said before if there is ANYTHING we can do to help you or your post let us know, we are there for you and will do whatever it takes to get the job done.


The VFW still has the same answer when asked “What will the VFW do for me?” Your answer is “we already have”. We have to keep moving forward.

Quarterly audits have been coming in and Post Inspections are being performed by the Districts. If your Post is behind in sending in quarterly audits, do not worry, as long as they get sent in they will count for the year. Just a reminder that all Post Quarterly Audits and inspections are to be mailed to the State Headquarters. The State Office will make copies and send them to the correct person to keep them on file.

One thing that has changed for this year is the Dues Reserve Fund. There was a resolution at the National Convention to eliminate the Dues Reserve Fund. It was voted on and passed, so Posts can transfer that money out of the fund and place it in the General Fund. I am sure that the new by-laws book will have more information on this. Another change will be switching to Roberts Rules of Order for conducting Post meetings. If your Post does not have the new By-laws Book and Roberts Rules of Order, the books will need to be purchased through the VFW Store.

Now that we are well into the year, every member needs to think about membership and look for new members in your area. The more members that we have, the louder that our voice is in Washington. The VFW has been a major force pushing Veteran issues in Congress. Issues like the Forever GI Bill can be a major selling point for the VFW with new Veterans. Thomas Tradewell was elected Commander-in-Chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars on August 20, 2009, at the VFW 110th national convention, held in Phoenix, Ariz.

Tradewell served in the U. S. Army from 1966-1968 and earned VFW eligibility while serving with B Company 26th Engineers 198th Light Infantry Brigade (Americal Division) in South Vietnam as a demolition specialist. His decorations include the Vietnam Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Purple Heart and Good Conduct Medal.

Tradewell joined the VFW in 1968 at Post 6498 in Milwaukee where he is a Life Member. He has served in elected and appointed positions at the Post, District and Department (state) levels culminating with his election as Department Commander 1999-2000. He served as national inspector general in 2001-2002. He also served as the District 11 National Council representative for members from the Departments of Wisconsin and Iowa in 2003-2005.

Tradewell earned an associate's degree in industrial safety.

Tradewell retired from Briggs and Stratton in 1998 as a Metallurgy Laboratory Technician after 30 years of service.

He is a member of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, Military Order of the Cootie, American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, Vietnam Veterans of America and Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association.



Senator John Thune Letter to the Editor

Among the highlights of traveling across South Dakota is visiting with the many veterans who have helped shape our communities and embody our state's selfless and giving culture. From one generation to the next, these patriots have defended our freedom and liberty, and we owe them a big debt of gratitude. In addition to giving thanks, we must also ensure they receive the care and benefits they have earned through their service and sacrifice, which is why I'm glad Congress recently passed, and the president signed, several important pieces of legislation that make good on that promise.

Most recently, the president signed the Veterans Appeals Improvement and Modernization Act of 2017. I was proud to cosponsor this legislation, which will overhaul the Department of Veterans Affairs' (VA) current appeals process so it can process claims faster and provide additional transparency and safeguards for veterans, their families, and survivors.

The president also recently signed the "Forever GI Bill," which will grant full GI Bill benefits to Purple Heart recipients, regardless of their total length of service. The bill will also eliminate the arbitrary 15-year window in which veterans were required to use their benefits after leaving the military and expand educational opportunities for veterans enrolling in high-tech courses like coding boot camps. Broadening the reach of this invaluable education benefit will help ensure that our veterans can build from their military talents and embark on new opportunities as they return to the civilian world.

The VA Choice and Quality Employment Act of 2017, which makes a significant investment in the Veterans Choice program, also became law in early August. These additional funds will allow veterans to get timely care in their own communities, rather than enduring long wait times and traveling long distances for care. The bill also authorizes leases for VA medical facilities, including a replacement Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) in Rapid City.





The current Rapid City CBOC is outdated and too small to meet veterans' needs. When I met with VA Secretary Shulkin and the rest of the state's congressional delegation this spring, the secretary indicated that he wanted to make these improvements in Rapid City, which is separate from former VA Secretary Robert McDonald's decision on the potential realignment of VA services in the Black Hills. That proposal is on hold while the VA reviews its national footprint and veteran needs.

I recognize that many South Dakota veterans still prefer to seek care at the VA, and that there have unfortunately been shortfalls in the implementation of the Choice Program. That is why I reintroduced a bill to make a position within the VA Office of Inspector General for a Choice Act ombudsman to serve as an independent, central collection point of complaints, which will help the VA and Congress better address any issues with the program.

Congress also passed the VA Accountability and Whistleblower Protection Act of 2017, which provides long-awaited and much-needed reforms to a department that has been mired in red tape for far too long. This legislation protects employees who are willing to call out bad behavior and gives the secretary the freedom to dismiss employees who are not doing their job. Misconduct within the VA steals valuable resources that should be devoted to veteran care.

I'm also pleased to report that the VA acted on my request to more prominently feature the Veterans Crisis Line (VCL) on its website, VA.gov. I suggested to Secretary Shulkin that the VCL be displayed in the first of four rotating banners on the VA's website or be given a dedicated button that is immediately identifiable on the VA's homepage. Within days of receiving my letter, the VA reordered its banners to feature the VCL, and I look forward to working with the VA to further promote this critical resource. Any veteran or member of his or her family can contact the VCL 24 hours per day, seven days per week by texting 838255 or calling 1-800-273-8255 and pressing one.

Our commitment to the men and women who serve in the military doesn't end when they no longer wear the uniform. In many cases, that's when they need us the most. We owe these heroes and the future defenders of freedom more than we'll ever actually be able to repay, but that shouldn't stop us from trying.

Everyone at Compassionate Care Hospice believes that patients are entitled to live as fully and as comfortably as possible. Hospice provides palliative care to reduce pain and help control other symptoms that are typically seen at end of life. is delivered by a TEAM of professionals, including volunteers, to meet the individualized needs of the patient and family unit. Hospice care is an earned benefit for those receiving Medicare and/or Medicaid with minimal or no cost to the patient or family. We care for many Vietnam veterans who have been afflicted with lung disease.

By electing hospice care the patient and family can receive many benefits from the service. We often receive feedback from families saying "I wish we would have started hospice sooner". Many times, hospice is elected in the final days or hours of life and there simply isn't enough time for the patient and/or the family to experience the full benefit. Again, care is delivered by a TEAM of professionals based on the needs of the patient and/or family.
