VFW at a Glance

Origins: In 1899, the American Veterans of Foreign Service (Columbus, Ohio) and the National Society of the Army of the Philippines (Denver, Colo.) were organized to secure rights and benefits for veterans of the Spanish-American War (1898) and the Philippines War (1899-1902). These two organizations merged in 1914, creating the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. VFW was chartered by Congress in 1936.

Membership Eligibility: Those serving honorably in the U.S. Armed Forces in a foreign war or overseas operation recognized by a campaign medal, in Korea after June 30, 1949, and recipients of hostile-fire or imminent danger pay. Veterans of World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Lebanon, Grenada, Panama, Persian Gulf, Somalia, Kosovo, Afghanistan, Iraq and other smaller expeditionary campaigns, as well as occupation duty, qualify.



4. How much does it cost?

5. Does it have a good track record?

A little googling about your group of choice will show if there any scandals or other information you probably would not like. If you're joining an organization because you think membership will help you find a job or because you like their lobbying efforts, you'll want to know their record and reputation first.

Celebrating 30 years with Nancy Bowers! Nancy Bowers has been an employee of the National Home for over 30 years. Not a child has come through this community without being touched on some level by her fun, loving and educational spirit.

Nancy, a graduate of Michigan State University in 1987, with a degree in Animal Science, found a job at the VFW National Home for Children as a Recreation Specialist. She remembers the job described, working with children, arts and crafts, and animal husbandry. The National Home's 4-H program had been around for a few years and they needed someone with Nancy's kind of background to step in

and build the program. At the time the National Home children were showing hogs, rabbits, sheep and goats. The rest is history and after 30 years the Home will lose a dedicated and valued employee.

The National Home helps families face problems such as post-traumatic stress, reintegration, high unemployment, divorce, suicide and domestic violence. These types of problems are most often felt strongly by the ones we call "our little heroes," the children of our military and veteran families.

A couple of instances of the National Home helping families are as follows:

When John returned from war, overseas, he had a very hard time adjusting to civilian life with his wife and two young children. Having few connections in the community, they move into the Home, where they were warmly welcomed. The caring environment helped ease their reunion and allowed the family to grow and thrive while John got counseling and job training.

Mary is the daughter of a Vietnam Veteran. When she and her children needed to escape from domestic violence, they found refuge at the National Home and more. Counseling for the entire family and a chance for Mary to finish college, get a good job and put the family on sound financial footing in their own home.

Find the key, unlock the message

This past year we set out on a mission to find and recognize all of South Dakota's living World War II Veterans. We called it Operation Whirlwind. When we started on this venture there were over 2,200 living World War II Veterans in South Dakota. Six months later, this is not the case. The reality is in a few years there won't be any living World War II Veterans and many of their stories will not have been shared.

Documenting veteran's stories is a way to archive our history, but it is also a great way to develop an appreciation for their experiences. It shows how far we've come and how far we have yet to go.

Veterans memories are of great value to family and friends. Some veterans freely discuss their service. However, many are not comfortable discussing their past. It is important for us to document their stories for future generations. There is nothing better than hearing first-hand what is was like to be there – the visuals, sounds, the smells, the fears, the feelings, the delay in communication. Our World War II, Vietnam and Korean Veterans didn't have Instagram, Facebook, Skype, FaceTime or Twitter. They may have gone months without communication from their families.

The past few years I have had the opportunity to be a part of the Korean War Legacy Foundation and the Korean War Digital History Project. Their goal is to preserve stories and pictures from Korean War heroes, creating a permanent legacy for future generations. Their program instructs social studies teachers on collecting and preserving veteran's stories.

Subject: VA Extends Record of Transparency with First-Ever Posting of Annual Nursing Home Ratings

This VA news release came out this afternoon about comparison of VA's Community Living Centers (CLCs) with private sector nursing homes. The Sioux Falls VA CLC is more than a traditional nursing home. Our CLC offers skilled nursing, rehabilitation services, hospice and palliative care. We care for Veterans with multiple chronic illnesses that may require complex treatment. Many of the services we offer on the CLC units – IV therapy, blood transfusions, nutritional support, and hospice – are not available in traditional nursing home settings. Because we offer more than traditional nursing home services, the data is not exactly "comparable" to private sector nursing homes in the area. We, however, are constantly working to improve care and services.

Another distinction is that private nursing homes chose who they admit to their facilities. VA accepts all eligible Veterans and works to ensure they receive the rehab or long-term care required. In addition, the CLC residents have access to in-house specialty care such as cardiology and pulmonology.

Our CLC beds are nearly always full with a current occupancy rate of approximately 95%. Veterans in community facilities often request to go only to VA and prefer to wait for admission because of the unique Veteran-centered care provided here. We receive numerous positive comments and compliments from Veterans and their families about the care VA provides.

Beyond the CLC, this facility has achieved a 5-star rating and is rated 5th in the country in quality. With diligence, we are confident we can improve our Community Living Center rating to mirror this.



Post 2750 Memorial Day Program

Post 2750 had a busy Memorial Day weekend. On Saturday the Post participated in the Mitchell Veterans Park dedication. The event was organized by the City of Mitchell. Post 2750 played a significant role planning and execution of the event. We had 6 members serving on the Park Design and Dedication Planning Committee. Several Post members began setting up chairs, sound system, and the stage at 0530 Saturday morning for the event. We set up a booth close by to sell Poppies, food items, and drinks. Post Commander Ken Schoenfelder was the Master of Ceremonies for the events at three locations in the cemetery; the Servicemen Cemetery, the Grand Army of the Republic portion of the cemetery, and the Navy Lagoon. Post member Jay Schreurs was the guest speaker. The Municipal Band played music prior to the service and during the service they played "Sleep Soldier Boy Sleep" with Jenna Miller being the vocalist. They also played the National Anthem and America the Beautiful at the conclusion. The Auxiliaries for the VFW, American Legion, and DAV presented wreaths at all three locations plus at the American Legion Cemetery. An Honor Roll of Veterans who passed away over the last year was read. The National Guard firing squad shot at all locations along with taps being played. The firing squad was a full seven man team to include an OIC. Of the firing squad four are members of Post 2750. A wreath was laid in the Navy Lagoon to honor the Navy and Marine Corps men and women who gave their live defending our country.

On July 25, 1944, Punnell flew his F6F-3 "Hellcat" with several other aircraft on a strafing mission against Japanese targets on the islands of the Republic of Palau. Punnell was in the lead position when the tail of his aircraft took a direct hit from anti-aircraft fire. His fellow pilots witnessed his plane crash into the water and immediately sink with no bailout reported. Interment services are pending.

Sailor Accounted for from World War II

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) announced today that the remains of a U.S. serviceman, recently accounted for from World War II, are being returned to his family for burial with full military honors.

Navy Reserve Lt. William Q. Punnell, 27, of Flandreau, South Dakota, accounted for on June 23, 2017, will be buried May 2 in Arlington National Cemetery, near Washington, D.C. On July 25, 1944, Punnell was the acting commanding officer of the VF-14 Fighter Squadron, departing from the aircraft carrier USS Wasp in his F6F-3 "Hellcat" with several other aircraft on a strafing mission against Japanese targets on the islands of the Republic of Palau. The mission was to strafe the Babelthaup (now Babeldaob) Airbase and the two Arakabesan Seaplane bases. Punnell's aircraft encountered intense antiaircraft fire over the islands of Palau. His Hellcat was in the lead position when the tail of the plane was seen taking a direct hit. He crashed approximately 300 feet from the northern seaplane base, and his aircraft sank on impact. The other pilots on the mission did not witness Punnell bail out from his aircraft.

Following multiple unsuccessful attempts to locate Punnell's Hellcat, it was located by the Project Recover, a nonprofit NGO of volunteers and professionals who work with DPAA in the Republic of Palau, in March 2014 through use of modern techniques and scuba diving grid surveys. During a dive on April 2, 2014, a DPAA forensic anthropologist discovered osseous remains in the area of the cockpit. The remains were turned over to the Palau Historic Preservation Office, and then were received by DPAA and sent to the laboratory for analysis. In April 2015, a DPAA Underwater Recovery Team excavated the site and recovered

additional remains and material evidence. In March 2016, a subsequent excavation was completed by SEARCH, an archaeological

contracting firm, where additional remains and material evidence were recovered. To identify Punnell's remains, scientists from DPAA and the Armed Forces Medical

Examiner System used mitochondrial (mtDNA), dental and anthropological analysis, and historical evidence.

DPAA is grateful to Project Recover and SEARCH for their assistance in this recovery.

Of the 16 million Americans who served in World War II, more than 400,000 died during the war. Currently there are 72,934 service members (approximately 26,000 are assessed as possibly-recoverable) still unaccounted for from World War II. Punnell's name is recorded on the Walls of the Missing at the Manila American Cemetery in the Philippines, along with the other MIAs from WWII. A rosette will be placed next to his name to indicate he has been accounted for.

Veterans' service, sacrifices honored on Memorial Day

DOI Secretary Zinke, Thune, Noem speak during event at Black Hills National Cemetery

STURGIS - On a windy Memorial Day morning at the Black Hills National Cemetery just east of Sturgis, families, veterans and public officials gathered to honor the nation's war dead.

Political leaders from Washington, D.C., including U.S. Secretary of the Interior Department Ryan Zinke, U.S. Sen. John Thune and U.S. Rep. Kristi Noem, sat alongside officials from the cemetery and local veteran organizations on stage Monday as wreathes were laid and Taps was played.

Zinke, a former Navy Seal, talked about Memorial Day growing up in Whitefish, Mont.

"The veterans walked by, ushered by grandchildren holding flags." He joked that the thenyoung Vietnam Veterans didn't "march as well" as the older World War I or World War II veterans. But he said now, increasingly Vietnam Vets are seen as the elder statesmen in veterans organizations.

"We don't sacrifice the older men, but the youth," he said.

Monday's event, presented by the South Dakota VFW, had somber moments, too. Rick Williams, State VFW Commander of South Dakota, asked Gold Star families - those families who've lost a family member in combat - to raise their hands, He also noted, his voice breaking, that "22 veterans every day take their own life."

"And that's too many."

Following the 11 a.m. ceremony, the cheyenne River Sioux Tribe also held a similar ceremony for Native American veterans, at which Zinke, Thune and Noem spoke.

On Monday, Craig Weber, a Vietnam Veteran and former member of the Air Force at Ellsworth Air Force Base, visited the gravestone of his wife, Geraldine, who died in 1990. "I try to visit every year," he said.

He visited with a friend, whose husband is also buried at the cemetery, managed by the Department of Veterans Affairs.






