Stan was born on February 27, 1930, in St. Joseph, IL, to



GETTYSBURG - Five decorated Veterans, all purple heart recipients, names were drawn out of a hat for a once in a lifetime opportunity to come to South Dakota on an all-expense paid five day pheasant hunt. Agapito Vega from Houston, Texas, Daniel Essig, from Deer River, Minn., Gary Evins, San Antonio, Texas, Rex Wilson, Fallbrook, Calif., and Doug Thompson, from Karlstad, Minn., were selected to participate in the 2018 Veterans of Foreign War (VFW) Post 8530 Winston Toomey Decorated Veterans pheasant hunt in Gettysburg, S.D.

"This is an awesome memory that I won't forget, it is my first experience at pheasant hunting and it was a blast and I would like to do it again," said Vega. "We really appreciate what you are doing for the Vets and this is so great." Vega is now retired and serves in the VFW Honor Guard in Houston which provides military rights for Veterans funerals, up to ten per day. Vega is a member of Houston, Texas VFW Post 581. "It was a little cold as I am from south Texas, but I still enjoyed it and these Gettysburg guys are great," Vega added. 

VFW Remembers President George H.W. Bush 41st President was last of eight to earn the title of VFW Member

The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States is mourning the passing of one of their own, former President George H.W. Bush, who died at his home in Houston. He was 94 years old.

"President Bush was highly admired within the veteran community and beyond," said VFW National Commander B.J. Lawrence. "He served as a Navy fighter pilot in the World War II Pacific Theater, as a U.S. congressman, U.S. ambassador as CIA director, then vice president to President Ronald Reagan for eight years before being elected president, where he would win a resounding war against Iraq and end the Cold War. Our 41st president was also the last of eight presidents to earn the title of VFW member," he said. President Bush was a life member of the VFW Department of Texas.

VFW at a Glance

Origins: In 1899, the American Veterans of Foreign Service (Columbus, Ohio) and the National Society of the Army of the Philippines (Denver, Colo.) were organized to secure rights and benefits for veterans of the Spanish-American War Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. VFW was chartered by Congress in 1936.

Membership Eligibility: Those serving honorably in the U.S. Armed Forces in a foreign war or overseas operation recognized by a campaign medal, in Korea after June 30, 1949, and recipients of hostile-fire or imminent danger pay. Veterans of World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Lebanon, Grenada, Panama, Persian Gulf, Somalia, Kosovo, Afghanistan, Iraq and other smaller expeditionary campaigns, as well as occupation duty, qualify.

During that time, I was also wounded while serving. Those are things you typically you don't associate with women," she said.

Purple Heart Recipient At SDSU Talks About Military Experience

BROOKINGS, S.D. - This month South Dakota State University became the ninth Purple Heart Campus in the nation. It means the university is authorized to use the GI Bill and also boasts several Purple Heart recipients at the school.

A soldier deployed during Operation Iraqi Freedom, Connie Johnson has been in combat and has the wounds to show for it.

"There was a bright light and then a loud bang and then I couldn't feel my face," Johnson said.

Shrapnel from an improvised explosive device hit the Elkton-native in the neck. She says she's lucky she wasn't facing the blast otherwise she might not be here today.

"It severed several nerves and so I can't feel half my face. The ear region, the side of the cheek and then down my neck," Johnson said.

In addition to this scar, the attack also earned her a Purple — *PURPLE HEART RECIPIENT, continued on pg. 10*

As we end 2018, we give a huge thank you to our volunteers. This year we had 399 active volunteers donating a total of 46,871 hours of service. This 2018 donations totaled \$110,000 of monetary support and in-kind donations.

Volunteer drivers logged 383,889 miles of service to our veterans with a cost avoidance of \$159,314. This also saved staff 3,517 hours of labor and saved the Sioux Falls Medical Center \$39,777.

The total voluntary impact to the Sioux Falls VA Medical Center and five outpatients clinic in Fiscal Year 2018 a total of 1.469 Million Dollars.

Thomas A. Pouliot was elected VFW Commander-in-Chief on September 4, 1998, at the organization's 99th National Convention in San Antonio, Texas.

As we wrap up the season's holidays, thank you to the VFW members who volunteer for the Sioux Falls VA.

Robert McDivitt, the new Director of VA's Upper Midwest Network, visited Sioux Falls and attended the Veterans Town Hall in October. Mr. McDivitt is an Army Veteran who has experience in VISN 23 as the Deputy Director from 2001-2006 and as Director of the Fargo VA Health Care System from 2006-2009. He most recently was the Network Director of VA VISN 10 with oversight of 10

medical centers, an ambulatory care clinic, and 63 Community Based Outpatient Clinics in Michigan, Ohio, Northern Kentucky and Indiana.

We'll host the next Veterans Town Hall again at the DAV on January 31st at 6:00 p.m. when senior leadership will brief everyone about what's going on at VA and open the floor to questions about health care and benefits. For your convenience, other VA staff will also be there from 5:00-6:00 p.m. to visit with you about individual health and benefits question.

As you all know, Darwin Goodspeed left Sioux Falls to become the Director of the Portland, Oregon VA Health Care System. Sara Ackert is currently the Acting Director. Mr. Goodspeed's five years here helped modernize the facility, care, and service -- including multiple renovation and construction projects and improving processes to improve Veterans' care. He shared his appreciation to VA employees, volunteers, Veterans Service Organization, community businesses, VBA, and others for their support. The recruitment process is underway for a new director.

Have you heard the Sioux Falls VA Prosthetics Team was recently selected as the VA Prosthetics Dept. of the Year? This is an epic accomplishment for a small facility! It recognizes leadership in prosthetics-related performance metrics and high standards of care and service. Some examples include process improvement in both small and large purchases and the ability to achieve continued success, self-scheduling for amputee and wheelchair clinics, administration of specialty benefits programs including Housing Improvements and Structural Alterations (HISA) and clothing allowances. In addition, the process to order eyeglasses was redesigned; walk-in clinics were created for same day access for orthotics and prosthetic devices; and the process to furnish eyeglasses was redesigned.

As part of VA's National Salute to Veteran patients, we now invite enrolled Veterans to enter pieces of visual art they have created within the last year as part of the Veterans Creative Arts competition. This art can be photographs, woodworking, jewelry, kits, paintings, and more. Please contact Shirley Redmond at Ext. 6889 or Denise Schwardt at Ext. 9-6418 to request an entry form or learn more about the competition. You may enter 1-2 pieces of art, and entries must be received by January 31, 2019. An exhibit of the art and a reception for the artists will take place on February 6 from 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. at the medical center. Some Veterans' art may go on to the National Creative Arts competition

Opening two new Community Based Outpatient Clinics in two months was exciting for VA and the communities of Spirit Lake and North Sioux City/Dakota Dunes! Both larger facilities and their staff look forward to having additional Veterans choose VA for their health care. Expanded services will depend on growing these clinics.

Last but not least -- If you haven't yet received a flu shot, there's still time. Enrolled Veterans may receive flu shots during regularly scheduled appointments or stop by one of the local Walgreens stores. There's no charge.

Utah Senator Stops Blue Water Navy Bill

VFW says 'We don't need more sick veterans to prove sufficient evidence'

WASHINGTON (December 19, 2018) — The objection by Sen. Mike Lee (R-Utah) to passing H.R. 299, the *Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2018*, by unanimous consent today on the Senate floor has effectively doomed any chance of the bill being passed in the 115th Congress. Lee now joins Sen. Mike Enzi (R-Wyo.), who objected last week due to the bill's overall cost. Lee's objection was because he wants to wait and see more sufficient evidence.

"We don't need more sick veterans to prove sufficient evidence," said VFW National Commander B.J. Lawrence. "Agent Orange made Vietnam veterans sick, and science agrees that there isn't any reason to treat so-called Blue Water Navy veterans any different than their peers who served ashore or on the inland waterways of Vietnam," he said. "What both senators have done is fail thousands of veterans — many of whom reside in their home states. Their obstruction to this bill's passage forsakes our nation's promise to take care of those who were injured or made ill due to their military service. Their objections put cost above faithful and honorable service."

The VFW-supported H.R. 299 would have restored VA benefits to some 90,000 Blue Water Navy veterans who had their disability eligibility taken away in 2002 after regulatory changes. The bill would have also helped other veterans and their families who suffer from

conditions related to toxic exposures. Veterans exposed to Agent Orange while serving along the Korean DMZ could have had an earlier start date to encompass the timeframe when various defoliants were tested. The current start date of April 1, 1968, would have been backed up seven months to Sept. 1, 1967. In addition, benefits would have been expanded to include children born with spina bifida due to a parent's exposure in Thailand. Coverage for this condition already exists for the children of Vietnam and Korean DMZ veterans. The legislation would have also required the VA to report on research being conducted on a broad range of conditions possibly related to service in Southwest Asia, which is important for future legislative efforts to create a list of presumptive conditions for veterans seeking VA health care and benefits related to toxic substance exposure, such as burn pits.

"Senator Lee's insistence to wait for more sufficient evidence jeopardizes the chance of H.R. 299 — or any future bill like it — from ever passing while these veterans are still alive," said Lawrence. "Senator Lee, just like Senator Enzi did last week, failed to use this opportunity to put tens of thousands of forgotten veterans who were exposed to toxic substances, and many of their children who sadly inherited a toxic legacy, first in their priorities," he said. "The VFW nor its members will forget this."

The VFW is again calling on all members and advocates to demand that the Senate pass H.R. 299 before the end of the year. <u>Make your voices heard here.</u>

VA Bears Responsibility to Make Student Veterans Whole, Says VFW

WASHINGTON (November 29, 2018) — The Department of Veterans Affairs released a statement yesterday regarding the implementation of Forever GI Bill changes that were supposed to have been enacted this past August. VA Secretary Robert Wilkie has now directed the Veterans Benefits Administration to cease attempting to implement the changes and instead reset the entire effort in order to get the job done correctly. The reset begins this Saturday, with the full implementation date now shifting to December 2019. Student veterans are expected to see positive effects of the changes in the spring 2020 semester.

"The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States was disappointed to learn about the 12-month delay in implementing this amazing benefit, but we recognize why hitting the reset button was necessary in order for the VA to get this right," said VFW National Commander B.J. Lawrence.

The Forever GI Bill changed student housing allowances to reflect the ZIP codes where students attend the majority of their classes. This change was required to go into effect on Aug. 1, 2018, but the VA admits that its antiquated computer system was unable to simultaneously handle individual ZIP code changes and the influx of students registering for the fall semester.

"Shifting the implementation deadline a year isn't a free pass for the VA to arbitrarily pay student veterans less than they are due simply because it was unable to correct internal problems in time," said Lawrence. "I appreciated hearing the VBA under secretary in testimony this morning address the need to make student veterans whole, and I pledge that the VFW will continue to push for the proper implementation of the Forever GI Bill so that all student veterans receive the prompt and full benefits they earned and deserve," he said.

VFW Calls New York Times Article Off-Base

WASHINGTON (January 5, 2019) — The national commander of America's largest and oldest major war veterans' organization is calling an article published yesterday in the New York Times off-base and biased against pre-9/11 veterans' service organizations.

"The article, entitled '<u>Veterans Groups Compete With Each Other, and Struggle</u> <u>With the V.A.</u>,' was biased, misinformed, and totally off-base as it tried to pit veterans' organizations against one another, and for implying that we are losing our voice within not only the Department of Veterans Affairs but within this administration," said B.J. Lawrence, national commander of the 1.6 million-member Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States and its Auxiliary.

"I read the article expecting balance, but unfortunately it was very much against any pre-9/11 organization and very much pro any organization that was created afterwards," said Lawrence. "Every military quality of life program or VA benefit we have today is because of the strong advocacy of legacy organizations who've been there, done that, and who swore to make it better for following generations. The legacy organizations, the so-called Big Six, created and continue to create change because our size enables us to have the wherewithal to hire and groom subject matter experts, as well as retain them," he said. "Our size also means we have the bandwidth to lobby on a multitude of issues on behalf of all veterans, service members and their families. It's a track record of accomplishments after accomplishments that every member of Congress, every VA secretary, and every president knows.

"There is much to be said about how relevant an organization — the VFW for example — must be in order to thrive for 119 years through multiple generations of veterans who all returned home from their wars and conflicts saying 'no one understands me," said Lawrence. "A large number of VFW leadership positions are filled by post-9/11 veterans who understand what came before and who today are dedicated to ensuring this and ensuing generations of veterans are properly cared for by a VA that we helped to create almost 90 years ago," he said. "No one in the VA, the administration or the media should ever drive wedges into what we do collectively on behalf of those too few who have served our country in uniform. I expected much better from the New York Times."



Yankton World War II Veteran awarded **Bronze Star Medal Posthumously**

U.S. Senator Mike Rounds (R-S.D.) presented the Bronze Star Medal to Yankton resident Mrs. Lucille Mjoen on behalf of her late husband, World War II Veteran Private First Class Gilbert Kjoen. The Bronze Star was awarded to Mjoen for meritorious achievement in active ground combat against the enemy on December 19, 1944, in Holland, where he was wounded while serving with the 104th Infantry Division. He previously recived the Purple Heart and the Good Conduct Medl.

"It's my honor to present the Bronze Star to Mrs. Mjoen on behalf of her husband, Gilbert," said Rounds. "Like so many members of the Greatest Generation, Gilbert was called to serve our nation during World War II. He joined the army in 1943 and fought in Holland, Belgium and Germany. We are forever grateful for Gilbert for the sacrifices he made to preserve freedom here in the United States and around the world. I wish that Gilbert could be here to accept the award today, surrounded by his family and friends."

Mjoen was born on January 30, 1925, in Volin, SD in 1943, after graduating high school, he joined the U.S. Army's 104th Infantry Division. He was a first gunner on the light machine gun squad and the 50-caliber machine gun. He fought in the European Theatre of Operations, specifically Holland, Belgium and Germany.

represent length of service on most U.S. military uniforms.

As such, the first and leaner of the two service stripes represents the organization's steadfast entry into its second century of service to America's veterans, service members and their families. The second, broader stripe, represents its first storied century of service, spanning back to 1899. In addition to the direct metaphor of the stripes, the visual progression leading to the build of the letter "V" represents our sustained and forward movement into achieving the VFW's mission of service to others. The distinctive gold coloring gives nod to the VFW's stringent membership eligibility requirements and the gold standard of service the VFW provides. The red represents the danger each of its members has faced and the energy with which the VFW operates.

In support of the project, the VFW has created individual custom logos for use by each of its 52 VFW Department headquarters in all 50 states and overseas, and nearly 6,300 individual VFW Posts.

"The VFW is such an amazing organization and just as relevant, if not more so, than any other time in our history. It's time all of America notices us and I feel confident this is another step in accomplishing just that," said Lawrence.

Heart. Johnson is the only registered women with a Purple Heart in the Dakotas.

Recently, the SDSU grad and now Veteran Coordinator on campus reached out to the Military Order of the Purple Heart. The interaction resulted in the university becoming a Purple Heart Campus.

Matt Holsen: How does that make a Purple Heart Recipient feel?

Connie Johnson: I think its an amazing thing that SDSU is willing to support and say, Hey we are a Purple Heart Campus. We support the men and women that have served.

SDSU Veterans Affairs Office Director Russ Chavez says the title means the school will go out of its way to help Purple Heart recipients and Veterans.

"We are a Veteran-friendly campus and that we care. It's not just an office to check a block. It's an office to make sure that you're checking all the blocks and you are taken care of properly," Chavez said.

Chavez and Johnson are working to get special parking for Purple Heart recipients at SDSU. It's a well-deserved spotlight for service Johnson says doesn't get talked about enough. She remembers the moments right after her injury.


"He came in and he put the Purple Heart on my pillow and then he walked off and met other people. Then I was fixed and then I was back out. No one really said anything. So when I got out, I never said anything," Johnson said.

Now she's telling her story hoping it will inspire others to open up.

"It helps me to talk about it because I didn't for years and years. So if anyone even sees this and they're like, 'She was fine. I never noticed anything.' It's because I hid it. You don't talk about it," Johnson said.

That is starting to change across the country and here in KELOLAND.

You can hear more from Johnson in Monday's Eye on KELOLAND. The former soldier focuses on her experience with post-traumatic stress disorder. We also highlight what SDSU is doing to address the mental health issues among Veterans and active military on campus. It's called Warrior Wellness at SDSU and it will air Monday at 10 p.m.

Hovey, South Korea. Essig has held numerous military positions including: Airborne, Infantry, and Cavalry Scout at all enlisted leadership levels at Ariz. Army National Guard (1985 – 1992), Minn. Army National Guard (1992 – 2015), deployed to Bosnia-Herzegovina (2003 – 2004), deployed to Iraq (2005 – 2007), and deployed to Kuwait and conducted missions in Iraq (2011 – 2012). Essig received his purple heart as a result of wounds received as a result of an IED explosion in Iraq in Aug. 2006.

Essig's son is currently serving as an Infantry Captain in the Minnesota Army National Guard. "This was my first experience at pheasant hunting, but I do hunt deer, ruffed grouse, ducks, and geese.

Essig enlisted when he was seventeen and entered active duty at eighteen, later leaving active duty when he was twenty-two. Essig enlisted in the Army National Guard at twenty-six and retired from the Army National Guard at fifty-six. "Since I retired, my plans are to spend more time with my family, enjoying the grandkids and cruising on my new Harley Davidson motorcycle," Essig said. He is a life member of the Deer River, Minn. VFW Post 2720.

Gary "Doc" Evins, served in the U.S. Navy from July 1965 to May 1968 and was in the United States Marine Corp as a Combat Hospital Corpsman (Medic) in Vietnam.

Evins received two Purple Hearts, one on July 7, 1967 and the second on August 27, 1967. "Both times we walked into ambushes and I was wounded the first time from a grenade and a gun shot in the right hip the second time," Evins said.

Evins father was a Marine at Pearl Harbor when Japan bombed it, so it was expected of him to join the USMC. Immediately after graduation from high school, he went to enlist in the Marine Corp at the age of eighteen. "They informed me that all medical support for the USMC comes from the Navy, so I enlisted in the Navy and after training I was assigned to serve the remainder of my time with the Marines," Evins added. He served as a combat hospital corpsman with a couple Marine corps units, but after being wounded the second time, he was returned to the States and spent eleven months in a military hospital. After almost a year recovering from being wounded, he was medically retired in May 1968. "I was nineteen years old when I went to Vietnam and retired at age twenty," said Evins.

He was wounded both times while rendering medical support to fellow Marines in his unit. Evins always wanted to be a doctor but after spending so much time in the hospital his desire to stay in the medical field was lost, so he went to engineering school. He worked for Siemens Engineering, a German company, in the automation division. A memorable project he worked on was being responsible for the motors on the Panama Canal and he retired from Siemens seven years ago.

"It was an award winning day, and an experience I will never forget," said Gary Evins, after shooting several pheasants. Evins is a member of the San Antonio, Texas VFW Post 8541 and Purple Heart Chapter in San Antonio. Evins has never been to South Dakota and never hunted pheasant, but enjoyed visiting and plans to return soon.

Rex Wilson, was drafted at age twenty into the Army in Nov. 1967 and trained in Fort Ord, Calif., starting in Jan. 1968, and then completed Basic and Advance Infantry Training (AIT). "I was a squad leader in basic and acting drill sargent in AIT, went to leadership preparation course, was in 11-B-10 Infantry, went to Germany and was in 11-B-20 Mechanized Infantry," Wilson said. "I was supposed to be there for 18 months but was called to Vietnam." Wilson fought for his country and was wounded Aug. 12, 1969 and was proud to have received the Purple Heart award. "Another unit was being over run and our unit just came back from a mission and I jumped on a tank at Quentin to help the unit and was blown off by mortar or artillery," Wilson added. "I still have a bunch of shrapnel in my lower back."

Wilson read about the pheasant hunt in a VFW article and thought it sounded like a wonderful thing to spend time with fellow veterans, and he has family and friends in S.D., so he applied. Wilson have never hunted pheasant, but used to hunt deer and elk in Calif and Colo. Wilson's dad and uncles served during World War II in the Army and both of his brothers-in-law were in the Navy and served in the Korean war.

"I just want to thank everyone for the lifetime experience of being chosen with these other Vets for the wonderful event that the Gettysburg S.D. VFW hosts," Wilson said.

Wilson lives in Fallbrook California and plans to join the VFW Post 1924 .

"Fantastic, awesome, I have never met so many nice people and it is an honor to be here and I really enjoyed the heck out of it, and I haven't had this much fun in a very long time," Wilson said. "I think it is wonderful you do this for the Vets and it really means something special to me."

"This pheasant hunt has had many positive impacts for the community," Darwin Tolzin, Department of South Dakota VFW Quartermaster, said. "It is a year long effort, from having fundraisers, arrangement of locations to hunt, housing, and food for morning, noon, and evening is never ending." With the motto of the VFW being "No one does more for Veterans" this project falls right into that commitment. The Gettysburg VFW Winston Toomey Post 8530 members are responsible for making things happen and have full control of the event with only assistance from others.

The Gettysburg VFW Post 8530 got the opportunity to host the pheasant hunt when another area chapter approached them a few years ago asking if they were willing to take it over. "We saw it as an opportunity to give our fellow Veterans an opportunity to do something they may never get to experience, plus a chance to come to our area, meet our members, and our community, which is one of the most patriotic communities in the country," said Butch Anderson, VFW member and this years event coordinator. The Gettysburg VFW received 44 applications for this year's hunt. Due to the large number of applicants for five hunting spots, all names were put into a hat and five were drawn out plus two alternates. "Let your fellow service members know about this hunt, talk about it at your VFW meetings, and of course financial aid is always appreciated," Anderson added. Anderson was in the US Army from March of 1969 through the end of October 1970, serving in Vietnam in 1969 and 1970.


